- > The Court <u>will not</u> appoint a free or low-cost attorney for you.
- > The Court might not delay the trial for you to hire an attorney.
- Unless you apply (use JDF 205) and qualify for a fee waiver, a jury fee of \$98.00 must be paid at the time the demand for jury trial is made. <u>The fee is non-refundable if</u> you change your mind later.
- If you demand a jury trial, it is your responsibility to understand the jury selection process. This process is known as "Voir Dire."
- > You may be required to provide suggested jury instructions.
- Colorado Rules of County Court Civil Procedure and the Colorado Rules of Evidence will apply in all cases.
- Self-represented parties are be held to the same standard as parties with attorneys.
- You must be prepared to proceed the day of trial. This may include opening and closing statements, direct and cross examination of witnesses, and having sufficient copies of proposed exhibits for the Court, the opposing party, and all jurors.
- Jury trials are conducted in person. Parties cannot appear virtually for a jury trial.
- By law, you may be responsible for the cost of meals and provisions furnished to the jurors.
